# Featured Article: Go Bags by Mike Stump

The two questions most often asked of me are,

"What kind of Emergency First Aid Kit should I buy" and "What's in your Go Kit".

In this article I'm want to offer my thoughts on the first question and save the second question for another time. Usually I answer the first question with " well, that depends because everyone has differing needs and practices; every First Aid Kit is going to be different". Also, how the kit will be used will alter the contents as well.

Let me give you an example.

Currently I own five medical kits. Two I usually keep in my car, one in the house and two in my disaster supplies. In the car, one is a small one-time use kit with a few band-aids, ointment and such. The other is a Basic Life Support (BLS) kit with the equipment I would use as an Oregon EMT when responding to a medical call. Obviously the BLS kit is bigger and full of items not needed for a simple scape or minor cut.

So what about a kit in between; what about an Emergency First Aid kit.

For that I want a kit that meets the need not only for cuts and bruises, but also for burns, bone and joint injuries and the pain associated with injuries. Then there is always the need for clean water and protection from the wet and cold.

Below is a small kit I put together for a friends as a starter kit for their preparedness supplies to be carried in their car. This list should be read as "a kit to build your own kit".

### Personal Emergency First Aid Kit:

- 1 First Aid kit from www.sosproducts.com:
- 2 4" x 5yd Gauze Roll
- 2 Triangular Bandage
- 15 4"x4" Gauze Pad
- 1 Pair Nitrile Gloves
- 1 5" x9" Abdominal Pad
- 2 2" x 5yd self-adhering bandage (Coflex or Vet-Wrap)
- 3 0.9g First Aid/ Burn Cream packet
- 8 0.5g Triple Antibiotic Ointment packet
- 15 packet of 2 200mg Ibuprofen
- 25 2" x 2" Alcohol prep towel

#### 1 – Life Straw

- 1 Keychain Escape tool (belt cutter, Glass punch in one)
- 5 18 hour Body/hand warmer
- 3 52" x 84" Emergency Mylar Blanket
- 1 52" x 82" Emergency Mylar Sleeping Bag

Total cost for this kit is about \$48.00 with the biggest cost being for the LifeStraw(\$20). Add to this list you personal medications, fluffie's food and any items you want to include like rope, blanks, just-about-anything and I think you will have a good start to a disaster Aid kit. What ever you do, do something to prepare today.
